


Our SouthSide Family



n the spring of 2018, SouthSide was 1 of 9 teams selected from all over the world to participate in a special workshop with the team of researchers at Harvard University's Center on the Developing Child. At Harvard, SouthSide staff learned about the IDEAS Impact Framework, which encourages a fast-cycle approach to implementing, testing and refining programs. Since then, we have been working to apply these concepts to our programs and will continue to evolve our strategies during the coming year.



Average DIAL Growth



Expanding SouthSide's Impact

s a means to increase our impact in the community and to be a voice for our youngest citizens, advocacy has become a core pillar in SouthSide's mission. Our advocacy work is centered around increasing investment in early childhood education at a local and state level, specifically working towards quality improvement and sustainable financing. SouthSide is currently spearheading a regional needs assessment that will paint a clear picture of both supply and demand in early childhood, as well as outline a set of recommendations for increasing quality and access for all.
